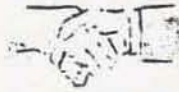

EMOTIONS AND NARCOTICS ANONYMOUS

In every day living, people experience a variety of feelings. Often these emotions are not completely expressed when they are aroused. Individuals strive, both consciously and unconsciously, to express themselves fully. The drug users attempt to express themselves fully by taking intoxicating substances and experiencing an altered mental state. They use drugs to validate themselves as individuals. Ex-drug users relate to drug users the ways they deal with their feelings. Through an honest communication of feelings, the drug user is given the opportunity to see how he might express himself without drugs and the risk of their manifold destructive consequences.

Narcotics Anonymous in Cleveland is sponsored by the Salvation Army's Harbor Light Center at 2304 East Ninth Street. Regular meetings are held at the Center on Wednesday nights at 8:30. The meetings are similar to those held at Synanon of California and Daytop of New York (programs which have met with success in curbing anti-social behavior), incorporating psychodrama, role changing, and the Synanon Game into a type of group therapy.

Narcotics have been in use for centuries and are now available to a greater portion of the population than ever before. Severe penalties provided by Ohio laws for illegal drug possession and sale and a significant number of inmates serving long prison terms in accordance with these penalties have failed to stem the tide. Narcotics Anonymous attacks the problem from a different angle. Group participants are given an understanding ear, but are guided to face themselves honestly (without drugs) and to participate constructively in their community. A man does not risk the results of improper use of drugs if he is satisfied with himself. Exercising constructive means to achieve self-satisfaction gives a man a better feeling about himself.

At Cleveland's Cooley Farm, Narcotics Anonymous is providing experienced group leaders to coordinate groups held for the inmates who have had drug problems.
