The Braddock Group

The Pittsburgh area has many addicts and cross addicted people who got clean in another 12 step program and eventually felt a need for an NA meeting. On August 6, 1979, the first NA meeting was started at Turtle Creek Valley MH/MR in the Drug and Alcohol facility, ~~723 Braddock Avenue~~, at 8 p.m. on Monday night. All it took was commitment to staying clean, trusting God for growth, and two women committed to both. They did what anybody who succeeds at anything does--they complained, made mistakes, hung in, had frustrations, fun, and kept coming back. They outgrew the facility long before they found a place to move, but finally in November, 1981, they moved to St. Brendan's Catholic Church; ~~18 Holland Avenue~~; Braddock, Pa. Of course, the group members feel it's the best group in the NA world--Don't you feel that way about your group?

The Roup Group

The Roup Group

The second group was started at Alpha House in January, 1980, at an inpatient treatment program. They later moved to the Salvation Army in Shadyside, where no smoking was permitted, so they again moved to the present location--~~5450 Friendship and Roup Street~~, meeting at 8:30 on Friday night. The members were determined that the group would not fold--they persevered--and God is rewarding them.

The North Side Group

The group started in October, 1980, and meets Sunday nights at 8 o'clock. It is the third meeting in the area and is home base for our A.S.C. meetings. Actually, it is the "hub" of the program in Pittsburgh.

Program information and materials are available, along with something that can't be bought--good fellowship from the three starting members and the group as a whole. ~~The group meets at 501 Avery Street.~~

The Friendly Group

~~This group~~ was started by a woman who (unlike most of us) came directly into the NA fellowship. ^{At the} ~~At the~~ second meeting, a guy joined, and the two of them held the meeting together. They meet Thursday nights at 8 o'clock at the Center for Substance Abuse, ~~120 Fifth Avenue~~; McKeesport, Pa. The first meeting was held on February, 1981. The group is rightly named--maybe because both original members have the advantage of NA friendship through service and going to conventions throughout the NA world.

Last Stop Group

The group's first meeting was held on July 4, 1981, at St. Francis Hospital, and they got off with a bang that Saturday night. They had some problems and had to leave the hospital, but they didn't fold. They were without a meeting place for three weeks until they found a place to move.

They now meet at the Wightman School, ~~second floor~~, ~~Solway and Wightman Street~~, Squirrel Hill, at 8 o'clock Thursday nights. They didn't give up, and the group is growing. There were three starting members.

The Jefferson Hospital Group

A husband and wife who were active in 12 step work in another 12 step program started the Jefferson Hospital Group on August 1, 1981, ~~on Coal Valley Road~~. They started in a small room but soon moved the meeting to the cafeteria, where they currently meet at 8 o'clock on Saturday nights. The group is growing.

Rain or Shine Group

^{Rain or Shine}
The [^]group adopted its name because its meetings were originally held in the park. When the weather got cold, the group moved ~~to 4800 Liberty Avenue, second floor~~, and meets on Sunday at 1 p.m. One of the three starting members told me that God, as he understands him, is "visably" present in nature at every meeting. The group started on August 15, 1981, and is growing. It is the only all-discussion meeting in the area to date.

The Brookline Group

They did so well in the beginning that they were able to loan a ^{group} ~~sister~~ money to buy a coffee pot to help start another meeting. Right on Brookline!! The starting date for this group was October, 1981. They meet at the United Presbyterian Church, ~~1036 Brookline Blvd.~~, at 8:30 Wednesday night.

The Crossroads Group

~~The group~~ started in October, 1981, at Trinity Methodist Church, ~~Center Church Road and Trinity Drive~~; Cannonsburgh, Pa., at 8 o'clock on

Friday nights. The group was started by two men involved in helping young people with drug problems. Initially, they were not involved with the NA program, but after seeing the recovery in NA, they talked to parents, MH/MR facilities, and anybody who would listen, and they now have a growing young group.

The Mon Valley Group

The ^{group} was started by two guys, one with three months and the other with sixty days clean time. They started in December, 1981, at the Mon Valley Health Center; Eastgate Plaza; Monessen, Pa; on Monday nights at 8 o'clock.

The members fellowship a lot together after meetings, bowling, playing video games, eating together, or just plain hanging out.

The Beechview Group

The interesting thing about ~~this group~~ is that its meeting is right on "the set," and one of the three people who started the group used to "score" on that corner.

They meet on Monday night at 8 o'clock at St. Catherine's Catholic Church; Broadway and Pauline Avenue; Beechview, Pa. "The set" couldn't have better examples that "it works." The group started on March 22, 1982.

The Uniontown Group

^{group} This group was started in March, 1982, at Uniontown MH/MR in the Drug and Alcohol facility near Rt. 40 by two NA members. They meet Thursdays at 8:30 p.m. It is a new group, and we wish them much success.

Our first A.S.C. meeting was July 12, 1981. (Pittsburgh area had previously been a part of Beaver Valley A.S.C., and they helped us get started.)

We elected officers and decided we should establish a P.O. box.

We felt that the most important function at this point was to "tighten up" the existing groups and start new groups.

We discussed having a "hot line," and although none of us dreamers knew how we would make this a reality, we knew that someday we would.


At our fourth A.S.C. meeting, we decided to make a 12 step list available to local hospitals and establish lines of communication with them geared towards getting addicts detoxed.

In January, 1982, two members from our area went to the Beaver Valley A.S.C. meeting to request the use of their "hot line" until we got ours established. They agreed.

Many seeds were planted at that first A.S.C. meeting, and we will soon see the fruits of those seeds: In April, 1982, a Public Information Committee will be formed.

On May 1, 1982, Pittsburgh will have a "hot line." The number is 391-5247.

There is talk of starting a "teen" and a Naranon meeting. Pittsburgh area NA is growing!!

- 81 Ohio - Jim Miller, Representative for Ohio, gave his report. Growing rapidly: 2 members started N.A. in Ohio in the spring of 1979. Began in N.E. part of state. Ohio is part of Region comprised of Western Pennsylvania, Central and Southwestern Ohio and Indiana - 35 meetings altogether. Meeting in Akron is almost a year old. 22 meetings in ASC in Northeast Ohio. Meeting lists available. 5 H&I meetings. 24 hour answering service for 6 months. Clubhouse started in Youngstown. Newsletter started (monthly). Over 50 people attended past 2 literature conferences (mini-conferences). Fund-raisers held. 1st Regional Service Conference this 4th of July weekend.
- 81 Pennsylvania - George Richards, Representative for Mid-Eastern Region, comprised of central and eastern Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, east and West Virginia and District of Columbia. Various ASC have chosen to form a RSC. Elected officers for RSC. Regional Representative Reports Continued.

November 27, 1981. Our Region is comprised of three Area Service Committees---U.C.V.A.S.S., B.V.A.S.C., and G.P.A.S.C. Our Region has a total of 38 meetings. Of the 30 meetings, seven are Hospitals, and three are institutions. We have about 250 members. One of the groups has had three functions of Public Information--community awareness meetings, going to have them quarterly. Another group has formed a Public Information committee and an Hospital and Institutions Committee. Tri-State Region and the Ohio Region sponsored a workshop in February 1982 to study proposed service manual. TSR had another workshop in April 1982 to go over input in the last World Wide Fellowship Report. We have two functional hotlines in our region with another to go into effect hopefully July 1. Future plans include hosting the Third Annual East Coast Convention and forming Sub-Committees so we can more successfully carry the message to the addict who still suffers.
