THE RESTAURANTS

Midtown offers many diverse restaurants for your pleasure. Whether your appetite demands the finest in gourmet cuisine or the lowly hot dog or hamburger, the area abounds in places ranging from quick-food stands to elegant, candle-lit dining. One thing — when you leave the hotel, please leave in groups and take care not to exhibit cash. Do not walk alone!

Moving West (right as you leave the front of the hotel) on West Peachtree, only two blocks away is Gregory's. Quiet, delightful, candle-lit tables, white napery, courteous waiters, continental cuisine. The prices range from \$1.75 for soup to \$12.00 for their most expensive entre. A real delight for evening and late, late night dining with the midnight breakfasts the talk of the town.

Travelling further down West Peachtree, at the corner of 12th and West Peachtree, is The Upper Crust — and it certainly is! Reservations please — but, it's worth it.

At Fourteenth and West Peachtree is Cha Gio's #2 — Homestyle Vietnamese cooking with prices ranging from \$2.85 to \$3.50 and out of this world food!

Follow West Peachtree further and you will intersect with Peachtree Street — West Peachtree is not the west end of Peachtree Street! Turn right onto Peachtree and you'll come to Tyrone's. Good food, continental cuisine, prices ranging from \$7.00 to \$11.00.

Butterfields is definitely to be recommended. Continental dining without the high costs of many "downtown" places. Soups are fantastic, good salads, prices ranging from \$6.50 to \$11.00. Double A.

At 14th Street is the Colony Square Hotel Complex with several fine restaurants. Across the street is The Sandwich Board and they are tops! Good sandwiches, as well as good prices.

At 11th and Peachtree, Brother Juniper's Restaurant is open from 11:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. Super fine sandwiches. At 10th Street you will find The House of Eng, not a bad Chinese Restaurant — moderate prices. A block later, Cha Gio's #1 — the home of Homestyle Vietnamese cooking. Definitely recommended.

Between 3rd and Ponce de Leon Ave. on Peachtree Street on the east side are a couple of restaurants, one is not to be

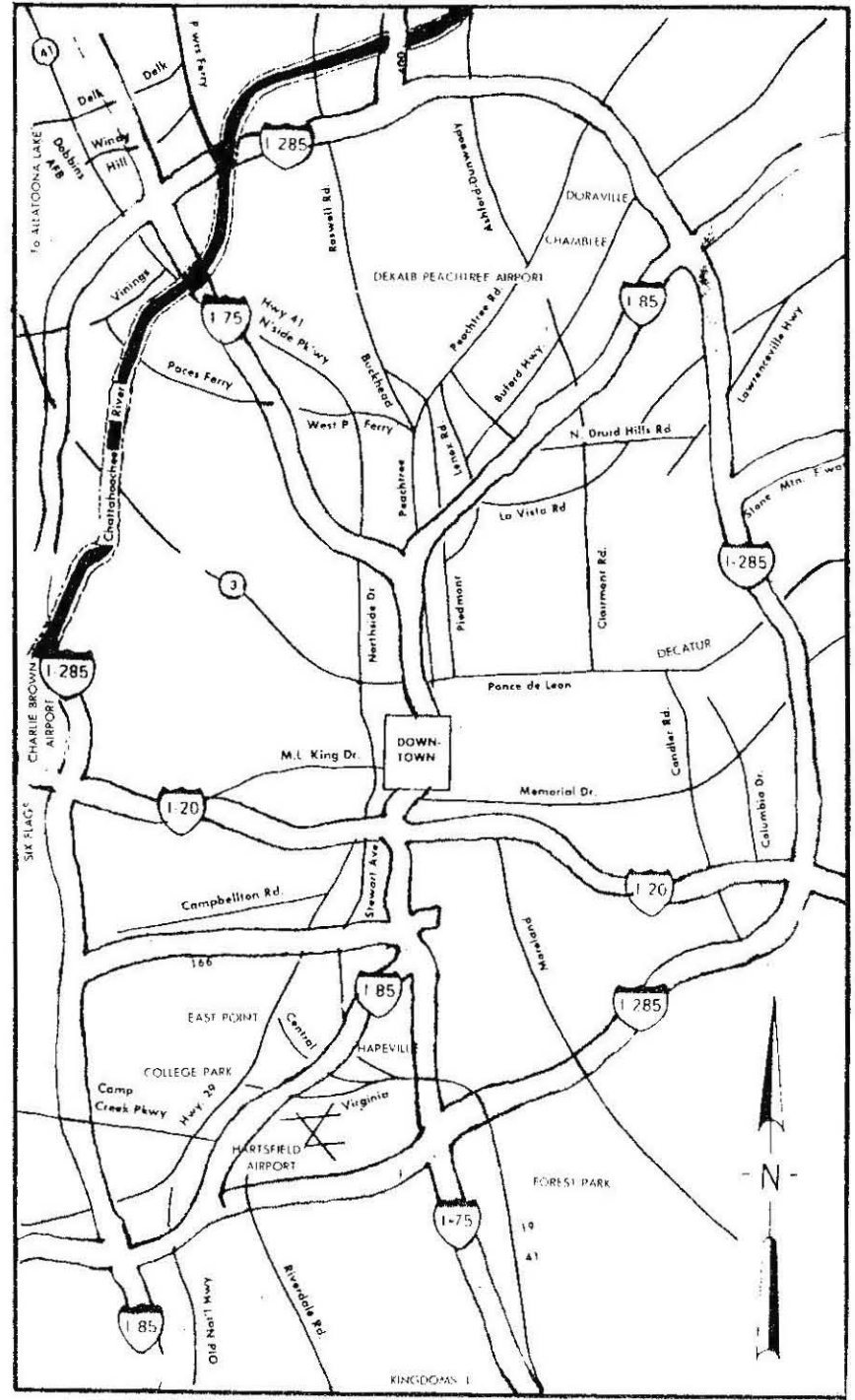
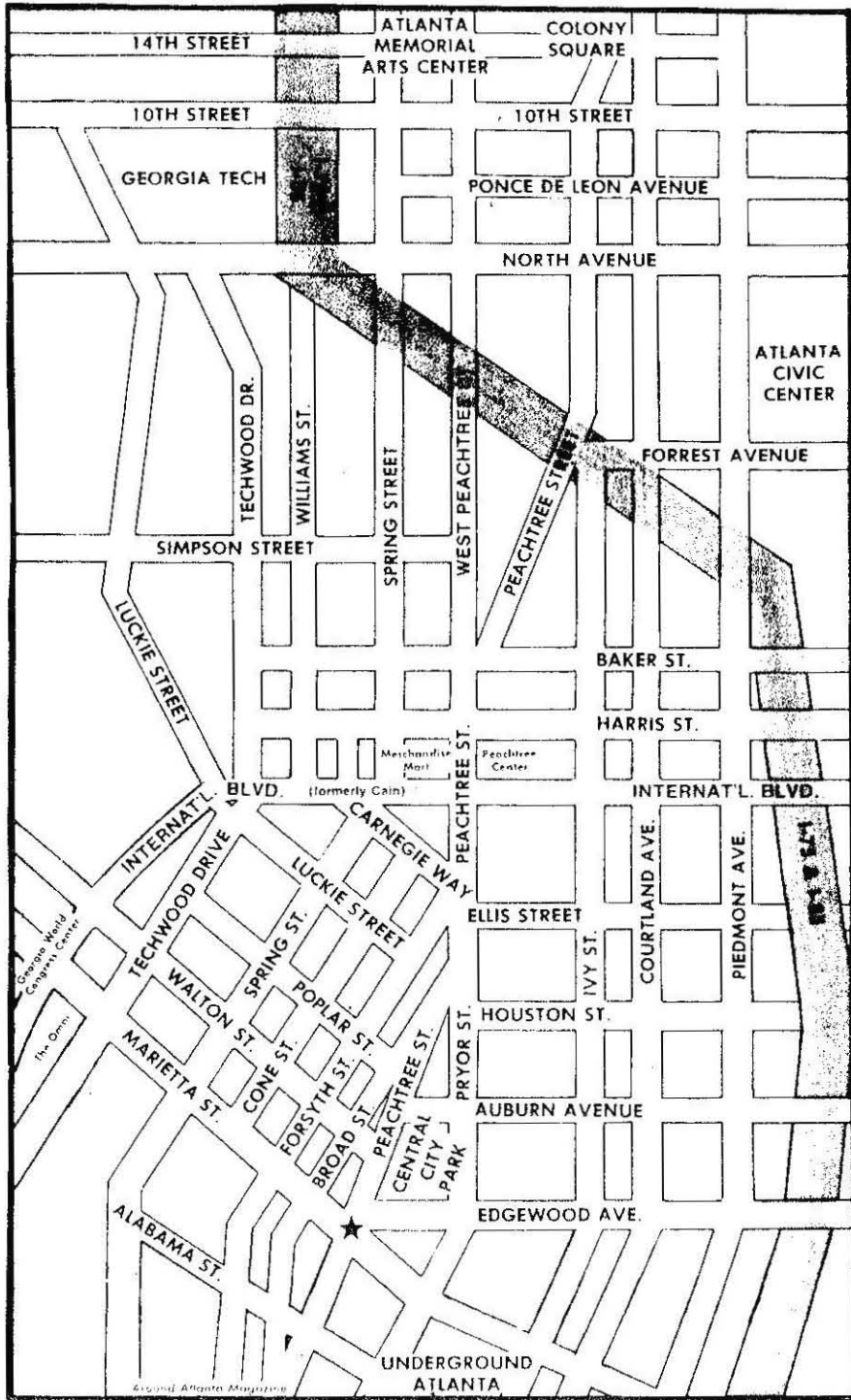
missed — Brandywine Downs — sandwiches which fill you to the brim, good service, prices \$3.50 - \$5.00. A complete meal — delightful! The Roundhouse is simple, lunch-counter style food, quick service, reasonable prices — nothing to write home about. Across the street, beside the Fox Theatre, Dunk & Dine is open 24 hours. Greasy spoon but really good coffee. A breakfast special for \$1.85 and a hamburger plate special for the same are their main items.

Turn left on Ponce de Leon Avenue and travel down three blocks to Myrtle Street. On the corner is Mary Mac's Tearoom — super good, home cooked food. Very reasonable prices. Southern all the way!

Turn left ¼ block and one of the South's most unusual and most delightful coffee shops — The Grove Cafe! Talk astrology with the Lady Morgan or Tinker and try your luck with Lilith as your waitress. It's open from 9:00 p.m. until 3:00 a.m. and has the best coffees, teas, cheese cake (butter pecan anyone) and other goodies that will tempt your appetites!

And, don't forget, The Falstaff Room in the hotel serves until 10:00 p.m.

We have been working on the conference in a very low-key manner since last fall, but now we all have been blessed with a great enthusiasm and our efforts are becoming intensified. We are planning many rally's, dances, and other fund-raising events, but all the money in the world will be useless without YOU! We are going to have a very exciting convention next fall and we hope you will join us in the "Fellowship of the Spirit", as we "trudge the road of Happy Destiny." BIDDING REQUIREMENTS

1. THREE N.A. MEMBERS WITH A MINIMUM OF ONE YEAR CLEAN AND SOBER, WILL REPRESENT THE BIDDING CITY.
2. BIDDERS MUST HAVE COMMITMENTS FROM AT LEAST TWO HOTELS, INCLUDING DATES, SHOWING AVAILABILITY OF BANQUET AND MEETING ROOMS IN THE HOTEL AND PROOF THAT THE HOTELS REQUIRE NO COMMITMENT AS TO NUMBERS OF PERSONS ATTENDING.
3. BIDDERS MUST PROVIDE A PERMANENT MAILING ADDRESS FOR THE CONFERENCE THE MAILING ADDRESS CAN BE AN ESTABLISHED ONE SUCH AS; AREA SERVICE COMMITTEE OR PRESENT P.O. BOX.
4. ASSURANCE MUST BE GIVEN THAT NO LARGE SCALE N.A. ACTIVITY WILL BE HELD IN THEIR CITY WITHIN A SIXTY DAY PERIOD BEFORE AND THIRTY DAYS AFTER THE CONFERENCE DATE.
5. STATEMENTS OF SUPPORT FROM THE N.A. REGIONAL SERVICE DELEGATE, AREA SERVICE COMMITTEE AND WORLD SERVICE CONFERENCE OR ANY OTHER SUCH COUNTERPART, MUST BE INCLUDED IN THE BID.
6. PROSPECTIVE BIDDERS WILL BE REQUIRED TO DEMONSTRATE FINANCIAL CAPABILITIES WITHIN THE TRADITIONS OF N.A. AS A WHOLE.
7. BIDDERS MUST ADVISE THE CURRENT COMMITTEE WHETHER N.A. IS REGISTERED IN THEIR STATE AS A NON -PROFIT ORGANIZATION.
8. BIDDERS MUST AGREE THAT ALL PROCEEDS AFTER EXPENSES, ARE TO BE TURNED OVER TO THE WORLD SERVICE CONFERENCE FOR THEIR DISPOSITION.
9. THERE WILL BE A MAXIMUM LIMIT OF THIRTY MINUTES FOR THE PRESENTATION OF EACH BIDDING CITY.

"I CAN'T WE CAN"

TO THE PROFESSIONAL,

We of Narcotics Anonymous are currently engendered to bring about more communication, understanding, respect and cooperation between Narcotics Anonymous and any professional person who works with drug addicts - so that more and more addicts may recover.

Long before N.A. came into existence, in 1953, physicians, hospitals, churches, the Federal Government, other agencies and other people provided life saving aid to addicts and they still do. We are profoundly grateful for the unselfish dedication of people like you to the welfare of people like us.

Many of our members were enormously helped or influenced by the spirit of the program of Alcoholics Anonymous.

Many also found assistance from family members, friends, and others who often rescue and befriend addicts in many ways. Obviously it is not true that only an addict can help an addict. A few individual histories clearly show us that non-addicts can be of great benefit to the addict.

FOR WHAT SERVICES DOES N.A. RELY ON THE PROFESSIONAL COMMUNITY?

1. Detoxification, hospitalization, medication, psychiatric and other medical diagnosis and treatment, or professional nursing and convalescent care.
(Some professional people who are members of N.A. sometimes perform some of the above as part of their professional practice, but these are not a part of N.A. membership or N.A. group activities.)
2. Housing, food, clothing, money, and other welfare and casework services; professionally staffed day centers, halfway houses, retreats, and rest homes.
(In an emergency, some N.A. members, as private citizens, temporarily help lodge or feed an addict. But we are aware that such assistance is outside the N.A. province, better performed by those of professional skill, experience, and other resources.)
3. Professional psychological, legal, marital, vocational, and employment counseling, training and opportunities.
4. Community organization law enforcement, and legislation in regard to drug-problems.
(Some N.A. members participate in these as citizens, but not as representatives of N.A.)
5. Professional research and scientific training and education.
(N.A. members often cooperate privately in these efforts, too.)
6. Theological and pastoral counseling, sacraments, and other religious services.
7. Initial case-finding and motivation for the still-denying problem user.
(Many of us are recovering from addiction today because some professional person "pushed" us into N.A.)

WHAT UNIQUE SERVICES DOES N.A. OFFER?

The personal, subjective experience of addiction is, of course, something only an addict can share with another addict. We have found that trying to help another addict - in our unique and often effective way - is good for us, whether or not the addict we try to help uses what we offer. For this reason, N.A. groups attempt to concentrate primarily on this person-to-person service, without getting involved in any extraneous enterprise no matter how worth while.

As a result, Narcotics Anonymous has had more than twenty five years of trial-and-error experience, face-to-face, with literally hundreds of thousands of drug addicts. This mass of intensive firsthand experience with all kinds of problem drug users, in all phases of illness and recovery, is unparalleled as far as we know. N.A. is glad to share it freely with any professional person... or any addict who wants it.

WHAT IS THE BEST WAY TO GET N.A. HELP FOR A DRUG ABUSER?

SERVICES AN N.A. OFFICE OFFERS INCLUDE:

1. Getting an N.A. member immediately to talk to any problem user (willing to listen), to take the patient or client to N.A. meetings, and to answer questions.
2. Providing the same sort of N.A. "sponsorship" promptly for the addict upon release from correctional, hospital, or rehabilitation facilities.
3. Giving information about where and when local N.A. groups meet.
4. Supplying leads to hospitals or convalescent care, and making emergency help for addicts available.
5. Arranging, upon request, to conduct N.A. meetings within institutional facilities, on an armed forces base, or anywhere we are asked.
6. Furnishing N.A. guest speakers for interested organizations, and cooperating with writers and communications media desiring information. Because N.A. meetings are held every day and night of the week in this area, N.A. groups offer continuing supportive contact to help the addict maintain recovery. In addition to offering this time to the addict, N.A. offices and groups can make available a wide variety of N.A. publications. By far the best way to refer an addict to N.A. is to take him or her to an N.A. meeting. Establishing direct telephone contact between the addict and N.A. while the client or patient is with you can also be effective. Some professionals who regularly make use of N.A. services began by getting to know several N.A. members personally and by attending N.A. meetings.

WHAT DOES N.A. COST?

N.A. costs the addict nothing; N.A. costs you nothing; and N.A. costs taxpayers nothing.

Each N.A. group is entirely self-supporting by (a) passing the hat to pay

expenses (there are no dues or fees), and (b) the small profit which is sometimes made on N.A. publications sold mostly to N.A. members and groups.

This self-reliance, and acceptance of responsibility for maintaining N.A. services without accepting any outside funds, has proved of considerable therapeutic value to many recovered addicts in N.A. who were once considered hopelessly irresponsible.

WHAT IS THE FIRST HARD FACT TO FACE ABOUT N.A.?

The organizational structure of Narcotics Anonymous is quite unlike that of any health or welfare agency known to us. N.A. practices may vary from place to place. All N.A. services are performed voluntarily by the addicts themselves and without cost. We have rules, regulations, and procedures that are suggested for our group purpose.

WHO REALLY RUNS N.A.?

There is no official governing authority in N.A. We rely on traditions, suggestions, and examples. The principle operating unit of N.A. is the local N.A. group. Each group is autonomous, and instead of officers with authority, we have trusted servants.

Neither the trustees of the General Service Board, local central offices, the annual General Service Conference (delegates from U.S. and Canadian groups), nor a neighborhood N.A. group has actual authority over any N.A. member or entity.

N.A. is not an organization in the usual sense of the word, with hierarchies of power. Instead, it is a fellowship of recovering addicts. This is important for N.A. as a whole.
