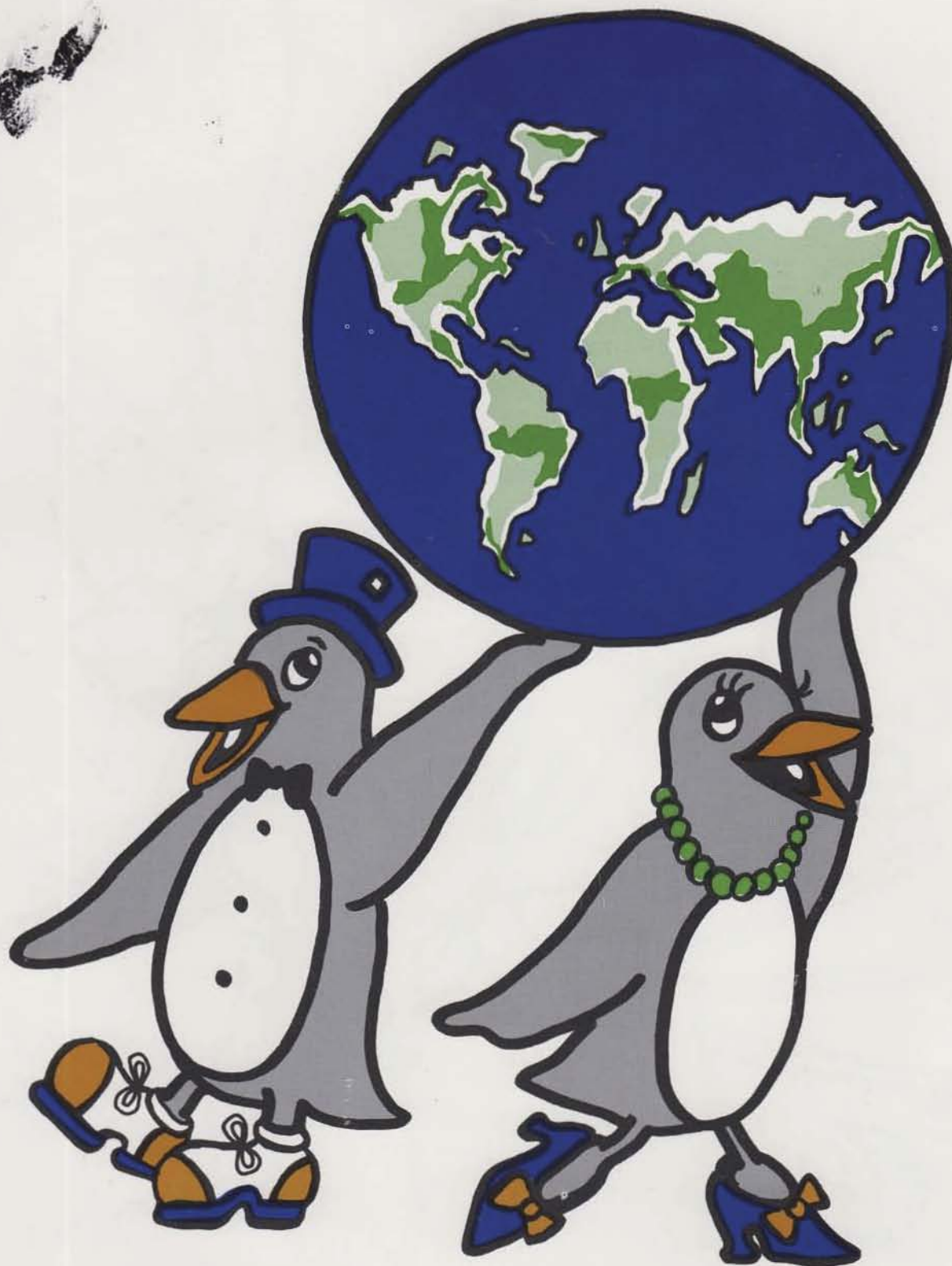

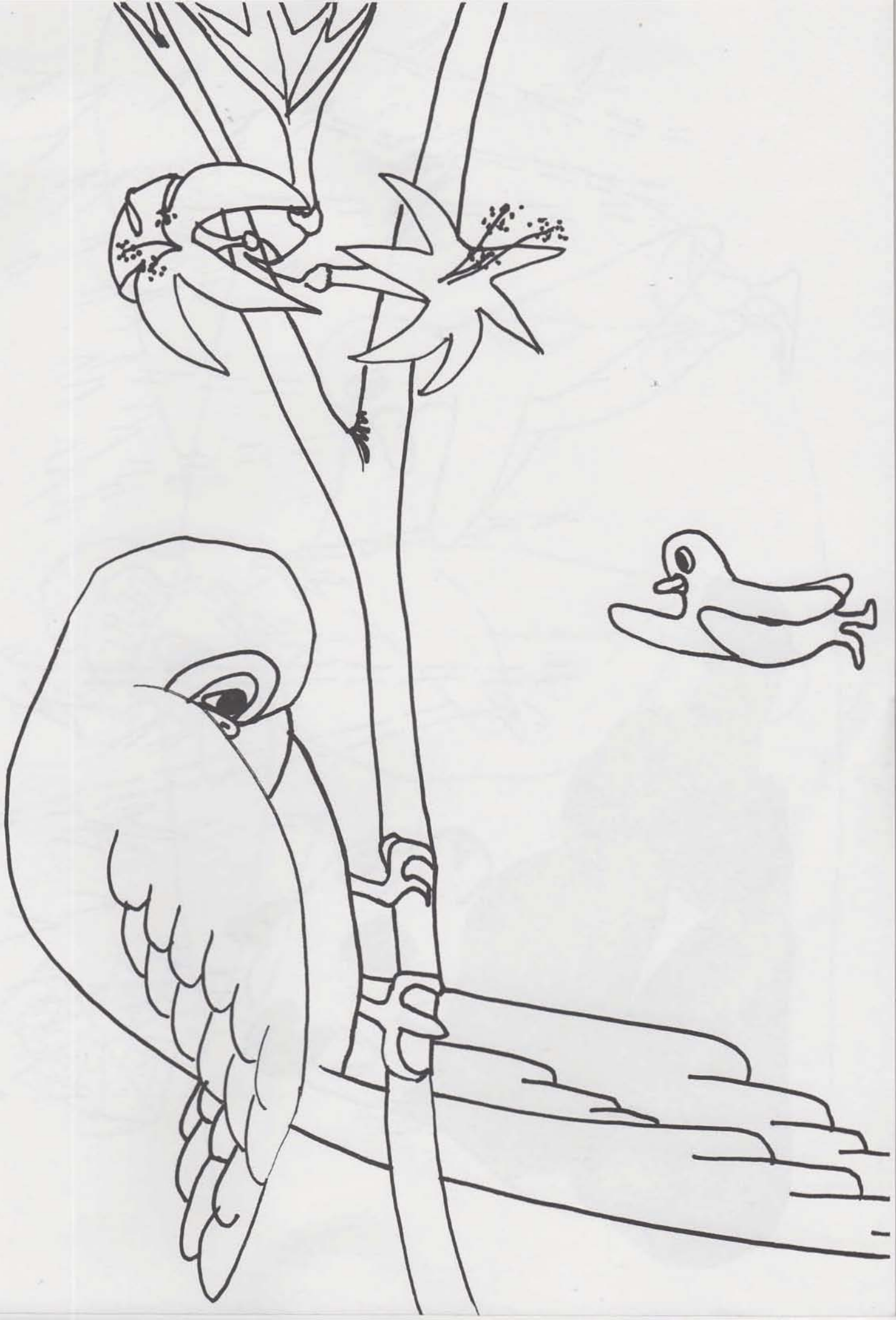

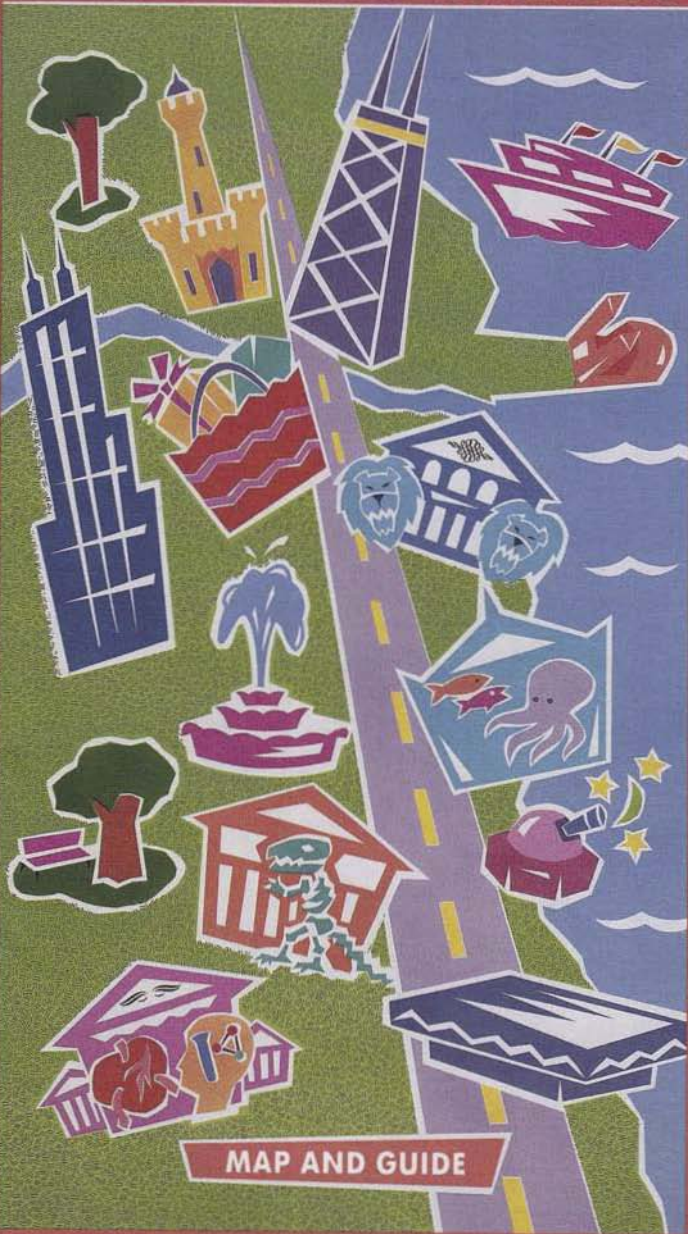

AIRPORTS

O'HARE INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT

(312) 686-2200

Chicago O'Hare International Airport has three permanent terminal buildings, with an interim international facility located on the ground level enclosed parking structure. For visitors needing information or directions, airport information booths are located on the upper level of terminals and outside the meeters-greeters area of the international terminal. A foreign currency exchange is located in Terminal 4. For flights coming from domestic gates, there are mobile carts nearby.

Chicago Transit Authority (CTA)

CTA's rapid transit train between downtown and O'Hare is easy, quick (35 minutes) and convenient. The terminal is located under Terminal 1, one block from the other terminals by moving sidewalk, within the airport. Trains run every 5 to 10 minutes days and evenings, and every 15 minutes from 1am to 5am. All trains go downtown. Fare is \$1.50 one-way.

Continental Air Transport

Continental Air Transport provides bus service to and from downtown Chicago, the Near North Side and the Northwest Suburbs from the baggage claim areas. One way ticket from O'Hare to the Loop is \$3.00/\$23.00 round trip. For information call (312) 454-7799.

Taxi Service

Taxis are located on the lower level of each terminal, taxis are available from 6am to 1am. A ride from O'Hare to downtown Chicago takes approximately 35 minutes and costs between \$25 and \$30. A Shared-Ride program allows visitors to be charged a flat rate of \$12.

MIDWAY AIRPORT

Midway Airport is located 20 minutes from downtown Chicago. The one-level airport is divided into three terminals: A and C for the arrival and departure of each airline's passengers and B, or the Main (middle) terminal, where the information booth and all vehicle pick-up services are available.

Chicago Transit Authority (CTA)

CTA's weekday rush hour bus service from Midway Airport to downtown is provided by the #99M Midway Express bus. For more information call CTA at (312) 836-7000.

Continental Air Transport

Continental information and reservation booth is located at Concourse A. A bus service from Midway to downtown Chicago is \$9.50 one way, \$17.50 round trip. Buses depart from Midway every 10 - 15 minutes, and passengers should be boarded in front of the Baggage Claim Area. For information call (312) 454-7799.

Taxi Service

Taxis are located in front of the Main Terminal. A cab ride from Midway to downtown costs between \$18 and \$22.

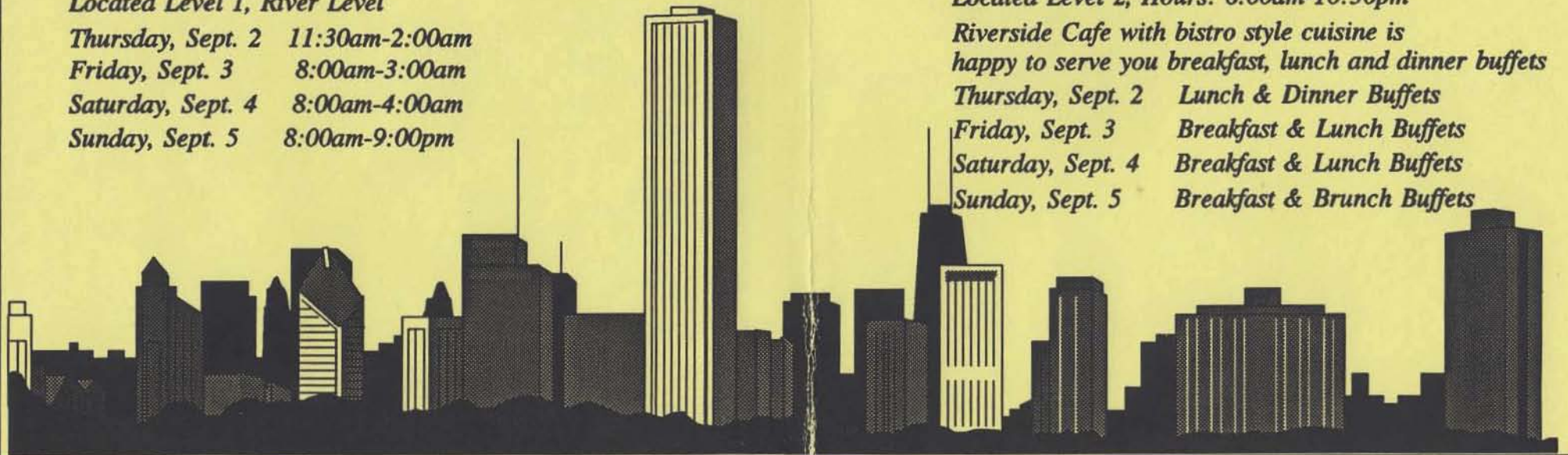

General Information

All events at WCNA-23 are non-smoking. Smoking is not allowed in the common areas such as hallways, stairways or elevators. Smoking is allowed only in designated hospitality and marathon meeting rooms in both hotels.

Twelve Steps of Narcotics Anonymous

1. We admitted that we were powerless over our addiction, that our lives had become unmanageable.
2. We came to believe that a Power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity.
3. We made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood Him.
4. We made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves.
5. We admitted to God, to ourselves, and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs.
6. We were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character.
7. We humbly asked Him to remove our shortcomings.
8. We made a list of all persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all.
9. We made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others.
10. We continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it.
11. We sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood Him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out.
12. Having had a spiritual awakening as a result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to addicts, and to practice these principles in all our affairs.

Twelve Traditions of Narcotics Anonymous

1. Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends on NA unity.
2. For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority—a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants, they do not govern.
3. The only requirement for membership is a desire to stop using.
4. Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or NA as a whole.
5. Each group has but one primary purpose—to carry the message to the addict who still suffers.
6. An NA group ought never endorse, finance, or lend the NA name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property or prestige divert us from our primary purpose.
7. Every NA group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions.
8. Narcotics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional, but our service centers may employ special workers.
9. NA, as such, ought never be organized, but we may create service boards or committees directly responsible to those they serve.
10. Narcotics Anonymous has no opinion on outside issues; hence the NA name ought never be drawn into public controversy.
11. Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion; we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio, and films.
12. Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our Traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.

To speak in this manner suggests that there are two diseases, that one drug is somehow separate from the rest requiring special recognition. Narcotics Anonymous makes no distinction between drugs. Our identification as ADDICTS is all inclusive allowing us to concentrate on our similarities, not our differences.

Responsibility Statement

Please keep in mind that your conduct is a reflection on NA. If you are unable to conduct yourself in a responsible manner, you will be asked to leave.

Shirts and shoes must be worn in all hallways and public areas at all times.

Please keep in mind not everyone stays up late nor all night. We need to have peace and quiet in the hallways between the hours of 11:00 pm and 8:00 am. Please keep the noise level in the rooms to a minimum. The Committee has provided hospitality suites for the convenience of group gatherings around the clock.

Just for Today I will have faith in someone in NA who believes in me and wants to help me in my recovery.

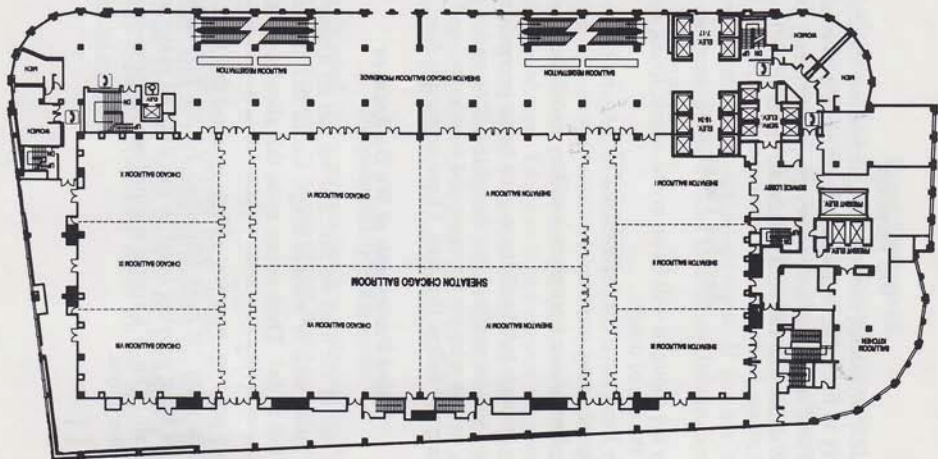
Just for Today I will have a program. I will try to follow it to the best of my ability.

Just for Today I will be unafraid, my thoughts will be on my new associations, people who are not using and who have found a new way of life. So long as I follow that way, I have nothing to fear.

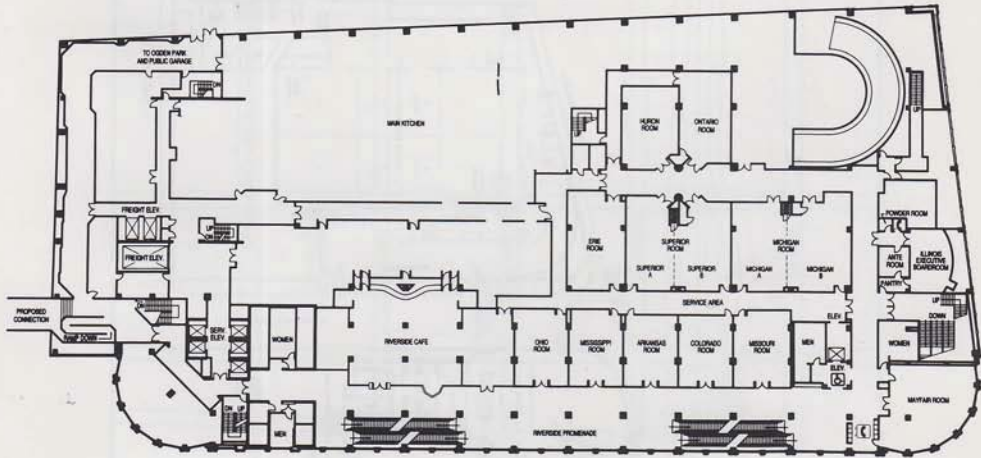
Third Paragraph of We Do Recover

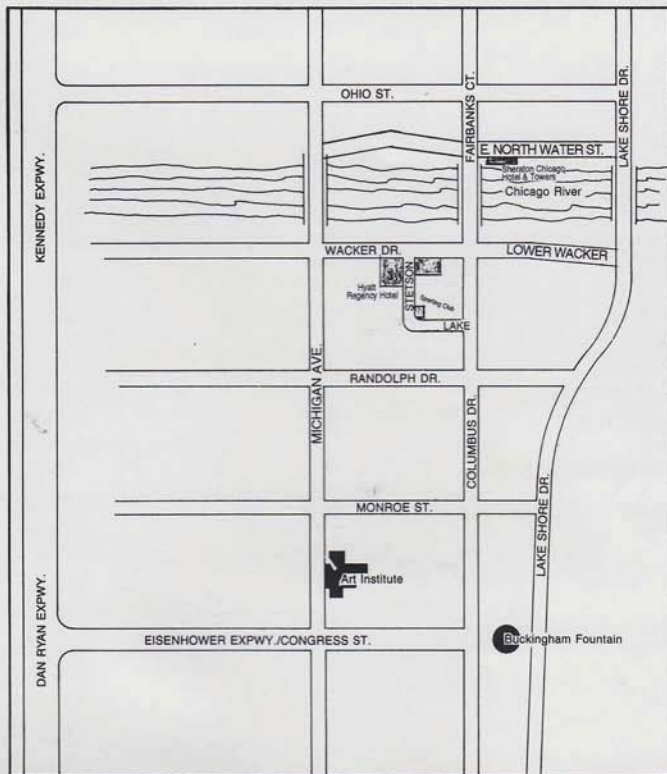
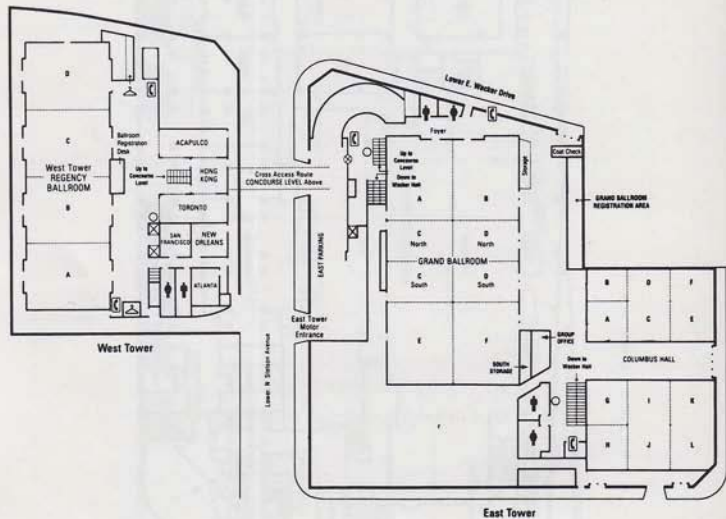


LEVEL 4 • BALLROOM
